The bus service is critical to the sustainability of the village. At present this is inadequate. There is no east-west service linking Midsomer Norton/Radstock
to the west and Bradford on Avon/Trowbridge to the east. The service linking the village with Frome to the south and Bath to the north is irregular,
unreliable and often full-particularly at rush hour.

- 1. In 2023 the sewage treatment plant spilled into Norton Brook on 66 occasions for a total of for a total of 832 hours, polluting what used to be a biodiverse stream. This treatment plant serves the village of Faulkland as well as NSP. The treatment plants in Beckington and Rode also have a large number of overspills into the River Frome which affects Farleigh Hungerford which is the next settlement downstram. The PC suggests that Wessex Water should be addressing this lack of capacity as a matter of urgency. This needs to be satisfactorily addressed prior to permitting any further expansion of the village.
- 2. Serious surface water flooding occurred in the village on 2 occasions over the winter of 2023/24 along the line of Norton Brook. This flooded two houses and came very close to flooding several others. The PC would like Somerset to investigate the causes and propose solutions.
- 3. The centre of the village is also the location of a crossroads where the A366 and B3110 meet. This busy junction combined with increased car ownership results in significant traffic issues including inconsiderate parking, damage to parked cars and bottlenecks on the High Street and Bell Hill.
- 4. The village has an active Traffic Action Group. Speeding remains a significant concern for other road users and pedestrians in particular where there are narrow pavements, or none at all.
- 5. There is a 7.5 tonne weight restriction in the village. This is regularly ignored by HGV drivers.

Please provide further information.:

The village has seen over 35% growth of its housing stock in the current Local Plan period; almost 250% of the expected minimum. Of the 119 houses permitted, only 8 have been affordable. The remainder have been "executive" type homes and have been unaffordable for those seeking to get onto the property ladder. Evidence shows that the majority of those moving into the village come from outside of the former Mendip area. Although NSP is less affordable than Frome, Radstock and Trowbridge (the towns to the east, west and south) it is significantly more affordable than Bath and its "green belt" villages immediately to the north. This draws people in from that area as well as from London and the Home Counties. This affordability is a major concern in particular for those wishing to remain in or return to the village to which they have strong connections. "Housing availability" is not an issue, but the affordability of those houses is a very major issue.

The foul sewage overspills from the sewage treatment plant are increasing; in 2022 the NSP sewage treatment works spilled into Norton Brook on 42 occasions for a total of 450 hours. In 2023 this increased to 66 spills for a total duration of 832 hours. Future government targets are for a maximum of 10 permitted overflows per annum. Frome, a town 28 times the size of NSP, had half as much "spill time" in both 2022 and 2023. Addressing this together with the spills from Rode and Beckington should be a priority and should be a condition of any further proposed development.

Surface water drainage is also an issue that must be properly addressed in any further development proposals and should not be left to planning

Renewable energy projects within the parish are likely to come forward in the course of the new Local Plan and these could be community led. The PC hopes that the new Local Plan will include consideration of this and give guidance on the balance between any proposal and protecting both landscape and residential amenity.

One of the former Mendip DC's last acts was to adopt the "Greenspace" SPD. The Green Infrastructure of the village is of critical importance to its character and appearance as well as the protection of biodiversity and ecology. The PC very greatly regrets the deletion of the proposed "Local Green Spaces" from Mendip's LPP2 and hopes that the new Local Plan will consider designating them.

The village has one of the largest village greens in the country, Church Mead Recreation Ground. In terms of recreation, this serves most of the village's needs. Being centrally located is critical and, being both overlooked and much used throughout the day, greatly reduces the likelihood of antisocial behaviour. A further facility including a football pitch and tennis court might be welcomed by the community as a benefit of further housing; however the location of this would be critical in terms of amenity, safety and accessibility.


